**RULES, PREMIUMS, EVENTS**  
**Rules and Regulations for Livestock Exhibits**

Rules and Regulations of the Arkansas County Fair Association governing admission of livestock are recommended by the Arkansas Livestock and Poultry Commission.

**General Rules**

1. Competition for prizes and awards by adult exhibitors is open to all exhibitors regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability who reside in Arkansas County. Residents outside of the county may exhibit for ribbons, but cash prizes will not be awarded.
2. The Junior Division is open to boys and girls who are legal residents of Arkansas County and are under 18 years of age or enrolled in school in the 2023-24 school years. The boys and girls residing in adjoining counties that are enrolled in school in 2023-24 are eligible for awards in the Junior Division.
3. Livestock Exhibits will be received on the grounds on Sunday, September 10<sup>th</sup> from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and on Monday, September 11<sup>th</sup> from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. They must remain until 10 p.m. Saturday, September 16<sup>th</sup> or premiums will be forfeited.
4. Check-Out Time will begin at 10:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 16<sup>th</sup> and continue through 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 17<sup>th</sup> at which time all exhibits must be removed from the barn and grounds.
5. Poultry, Waterfowl and Rabbit Exhibits will be received on the grounds Sunday, September 10<sup>th</sup> from 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. and on Monday, September 11<sup>th</sup> from 8:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. All exhibits must remain until 10:00 p.m., Saturday, September 16<sup>th</sup> or premiums will be forfeited.
6. All livestock are to stop at the entrance gate and wait for inspection of health papers and/or animals. No livestock are to be unloaded until the livestock and/or their health papers are inspected. If no inspector is at the gate, livestock will wait at the gate until the inspector arrives. **All paperwork required for check-in must be left on the property with staff, until verified by the Livestock and Poultry Commission Inspector. Paperwork can be picked up after the inspection.**
7. Exhibitors are asked to bring feed for their animals and containers for use in watering and feeding while on exhibit.
8. Each Exhibitor shall care for his animals during the day, such as feeding, watering, and keeping stalls clean by removing the manure as often as deemed necessary and piling manure at place designated by the show association. A caretaker will be on the grounds at night.
9. The management reserves the right to secure a veterinarian to check health of all livestock and poultry in the show. The necessary steps to ensure health and sanitation of all livestock and poultry may be enforced by the veterinarian on duty.
10. No liability is assumed by the Fair Association with respect to any entry exhibit, participant, or spectator.
11. The Fair Association reserves the right to make or announce any changes in this catalog if any emergency warrants such.
12. Checks for premiums will be mailed following the show. Not checks will be issued before this time.
13. Beef and swine placed in the show must have been owned by the exhibitor for at least 60 days and located and fitted by the exhibitor in the county for 60 days.
14. When any class has only one entry the decision of the judges will be final on placing and prize money. Grand Champions are selected from the first-place animals in each class.
15. Each exhibitor is limited to three entries in each lot of the market classes. However, only one animal in each class may be named either Grand Champion or reserve Grand Champion and be eligible for a special livestock premium fund. Market Animals are not allowed to show in breeding classes.
16. Each exhibitor is limited to three entries in each class of the breeding classes.
17. Only animals shown in the show ring will be eligible for awards and must be shown by the exhibitor or his representative.
18. Animals must be fitted, and halter broke to be eligible for awards. Judges will be instructed to discriminate against calves that are not fitted and untrained.
19. All animals of breeding classes entered and shown in the show shall be registered animals except Section J, commercial Heifers. All exhibitors are requested to show registration papers to Livestock Superintendent when the animals are entered.
20. Exhibitor or his representatives must be available to show livestock at the scheduled time or animal will not be shown.
21. Horses may be exercised in the arena only prior to 11:00 a.m. Stall space will be assigned by the Superintendent.
22. A further division of classes in the Jr. Market Calf Show may be made if number of animals entered warrant such a division.
23. A belt buckle for "showmanship" will be awarded to the junior exhibitor who is selected by the judges as the first-place showman. Appropriate dress is required: pants (not shorts or capris), long-sleeve button-down shirt (no t-shirts) and hat. The selection will be made based on: Fitting, Grooming, and Exhibitors' Showmanship in the arena.

## **Livestock Health Requirements**

All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of the particular species. Arkansas livestock (except for Arkansas sheep, goats, horses and steers and rabbits) must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 90 days prior to exhibition, showing the following:

**Arkansas Cattle**

1. Negative brucellosis test within 90 days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls 18 months of age and over. All heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested. Animals originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free Herd and Certified Free Herd number are shown on a certificate are exempt. If Arkansas is a Class Free State, Arkansas cattle are exempt from testing.
2. All heifers that are 4-12 months of age shall be vaccinated before entering show.
3. Heifers that were born on or after January 1, 2023, that are over 12 months of age and are not an official calf hood will not be allowed to show (unless they are from a Brucellosis Certified Free herd.)

**Arkansas Swine**

1. Animals 6 months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within 90 days of exhibition or originate directly out of Validated herd, with validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing but must be pseudo rabies tested.)
2. Animals to be tested negative for pseudo rabies regardless of age within 90 days of the exhibition on a test approved by the State

Veterinarian or originate directly out of a qualified Pseudo rabies Free Herd, with a Qualified Herd number and date of last tests shown on the certificate.

- Free of other contagious, infectious, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.): Otherwise, they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.

**Arkansas Sheep**

Sheep will be inspected on the grounds. No sheep showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, and scrapie will be allowed to show. All market lambs arriving at the fairgrounds will be slick shorn and will be visually inspected before they are placed in pens. Lambs will not be shorn or clipped on the fairgrounds. Slick shorn is: 1) Maximum of 7 days wool growth; and 2) Maximum wool growth of 1/4"; and 3) Britches will not be allowed on lambs. Blanketed or covered sheep will have all coverings removed by the owner or exhibitor for this visual inspection. Sheep showing active lesions of wool fungus or ringworm or signs of other infectious or contagious diseases will be released from the fairgrounds.

**Arkansas Goats**

Goats may be examined on the grounds by fair personnel, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel. No goats showing evidence of abscesses or certainly draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel. Goats showing evidence of any other disease may be released.

**Arkansas Poultry**

An official representing the person sponsoring the exhibition shall notify the State Veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition, giving the names, place, inclusive dates, and time of the event. The requirements for an exhibition are as follows:

- Pullorum-Typhoid status - All poultry, including turkeys and excluding waterfowl, present at exhibitions in Arkansas shall have originated from U.S. Pullorum-typhoid clean or equivalent flocks or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition. This information will be documented on an NPIP Form VS 9-3, 90 Day Certificate, NPIP Flock Certification Form or similar certificate which will accompany the poultry during the exhibition.
- Any poultry showing evidence of infectious or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.
- Record-Keeping - The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry present at the exhibition. The list shall contain the name and address of each owner, the number, the species, breed, variety, type, sex, and Pullorum-typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this list shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months.
- All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing bands), with a sealed band. Wrap-around plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowls are exempt from pullorum-typhoid requirements.

**Arkansas Horses**

- A Negative EIA test is required within the past 12 months for all animals over 6 months of age. Nursing foals under 6 months of age are exempt from testing if accompanied by negative tested dams. Photocopies will not be accepted; carbon copies are acceptable.
- No stallion classes will be offered, and no stallion will be stalled on the premises over 10 months of age.

The fair board of any county, district, or the state fair reserves the right to have blood and urine laboratory analysis made for any animal at their fair.

Any exhibitor administering a drug to an animal which would render the carcass unfit for human consumption or any exhibitor of an animal producing an analysis indicating the presence of an unapproved drug that can result in a quantitative or qualitative change in the characteristic of the animal will be required to return all premium money and could be banned from further competition. Their name and the lab analysis will be submitted to the USDA and FDA for further investigation and possible prosecution.

**Disclosure:**

Any animal receiving medication for any life-threatening disease or illness must be registered at the time they are entered into the fair.

A Committee, appointed by the Arkansas County Fair Association President, shall have the authority to determine number of and division of classes as deemed necessary when weights and number of entries warrant such a division, the decision of the committee is final.
